

| Littlejohn Lane | Emma Linda Palmer Littlejohn (1883-1949) | Feminist, journalist and radio commentator |
| | | Her novel <i>Life and Lucille</i> (1933) dramatized the need for women in parliament, divorce reform and the introduction of adequate training to enable women to be economically independent of their fathers and husbands. |
| Maclurcan Street | Hannah Maclurcan (1860-1936) | Hotelier, food writer and journalist |
| | | Mrs Maclurcan's Cookery Book: A Collection of Practical Recipes, Specially Suitable for Australia, published at Townsville (1898) – 20 editions and The 20th Century Cookery Book: A Thousand Practical Recipes for Everyday Use (1901) were two of her noted works. |
| Rolls Street | Eric Rolls AM | Philosopher and author |
| (19 | (1923-2007) | Author of <i>A Million Wild Acres</i> , published more than 20 books and known for his celebration of the Australian land. |
| Schauer Lane | Amy Schauer (1871-1956) | Cookery instructor, writer and war effort |
| | | Amy wrote popular cookery books which were used in homes and technical colleges. Her early work included <i>Cookery for Invalids</i> (1908), <i>Fruit Preserving and Confectionery</i> (1908), and <i>Theory of Cookery</i> (1909) which was republished as <i>The Schauer Australian Cookery Book</i> . |
| Stonehouse Street | Ethel Nhill Victoria Stonehouse (1883-1964) | Writer |
| | | Ethel published verse, short stories and novels of which <i>Smouldering Fires</i> and <i>Earthware</i> are two. |
| Wildman Street | Alexina Maude Wildman (1867-1896) | Journalist |
| | | Alexina wrote for the Bulletin from 1888 to 1896 as gossip columnist 'Sappho Smith'. |
