A Bill for

An Act to establish the Office of the Legislative Assembly, and for other purposes

The Legislative Assembly for the Australian Capital Territory enacts as follows:

1 **Part 1 Preliminary**

2 **1 Name of Act**

3 This Act is the *Legislative Assembly (Office of the Legislative*
4 *Assembly) Act 2012.*

5 **2 Commencement**

6 This Act commences on 1 July 2012.

7 *Note* The naming and commencement provisions automatically commence on
8 the notification day (see Legislation Act, s 75 (1)).

9 **3 Dictionary**

10 The dictionary at the end of this Act is part of this Act.

11 *Note 1* The dictionary at the end of this Act defines certain terms used in this
12 Act, and includes references (*signpost definitions*) to other terms
13 defined elsewhere in this Act.

14 For example, the signpost definition ‘*office*—see section 5 (1).’ means
15 that the term ‘office’ is defined in that section.

16 *Note 2* A definition in the dictionary (including a signpost definition) applies to
17 the entire Act unless the definition, or another provision of the Act,
18 provides otherwise or the contrary intention otherwise appears (see
19 Legislation Act, s 155 and s 156 (1)).

20 **4 Notes**

21 A note included in this Act is explanatory and is not part of this Act.

22 *Note* See the Legislation Act, s 127 (1), (4) and (5) for the legal status of
23 notes.

1 **Part 2** **Office of the Legislative**
2 **Assembly**

3 **5** **Establishment of Office of the Legislative Assembly**

- 4 (1) The Office of the Legislative Assembly (the *office*) is established.
5 (2) The office consists of—
6 (a) the clerk; and
7 (b) the staff of the office.

8 **6** **Functions of office**

- 9 (1) The office's function is to provide impartial advice and support to
10 the Legislative Assembly and committees and members of the
11 Assembly, including by—
12 (a) providing advice on parliamentary practice and procedure and
13 the functions of the Assembly and committees; and
14 (b) reporting proceedings of the Assembly and meetings of
15 committees; and
16 (c) maintaining an official record of proceedings of the Assembly;
17 and
18 (d) providing library and information facilities and services for
19 members; and
20 (e) providing staff to enable the Assembly and committees to
21 operate efficiently; and
22 (f) providing business support functions, including administering
23 the entitlements of members who are not part of the Executive;
24 and
25 (g) maintaining the Assembly precincts.

1 (2) The office also has the function of providing public education about
2 the functions of the Assembly and committees.

3 (3) The office may exercise any other function given to it under this Act
4 or another territory law.

5 *Note* A provision of a law that gives an entity a function also gives the entity
6 powers necessary and convenient to exercise the function (see
7 Legislation Act, s 196 and dict, pt 1, def *entity*).

8 (4) In this section:

9 *Assembly precincts*—see the *Legislative Assembly Precincts*
10 *Act 2001*, dictionary.

11 **7 Staff of office**

12 (1) The office's staff must be employed under the *Public Sector*
13 *Management Act 1994*.

14 (2) The clerk has the powers mentioned in the *Public Sector*
15 *Management Act 1994*, section 25 (3) in relation to the office's staff.

16 **8 Independence of office**

17 The clerk and the office's staff are not subject to direction by the
18 Executive or any Minister in the exercise of their functions.

1 Part 3 Clerk of the Legislative Assembly

2 9 Appointment of Clerk of the Legislative Assembly

- 3 (1) The Speaker must, on behalf of the Territory, appoint a person as
4 Clerk of the Legislative Assembly.
- 5 (2) The appointment must be made—
- 6 (a) on the advice of the administration and procedure committee;
7 and
- 8 (b) in consultation with the Chief Minister; and
- 9 (c) in consultation with the Leader of the Opposition; and
- 10 (d) in accordance with the merit principles set out in the *Public*
11 *Sector Management Act 1994*, section 65 (Application of merit
12 principle).
- 13 *Note* For the making of appointments, see the Legislation Act, pt 19.3.
- 14 (3) The Speaker must not appoint a person as clerk unless satisfied that
15 the person has extensive knowledge of, and experience in, relevant
16 parliamentary law, practice and procedure.
- 17 (4) The clerk is appointed on the terms (if any) in relation to matters not
18 provided for by this part or a determination under the *Remuneration*
19 *Tribunal Act 1995* that are prescribed by the management standards
20 under the *Public Sector Management Act 1994*.

21 10 Functions of clerk

- 22 (1) The clerk is responsible for the management of the office.
- 23 (2) The clerk may exercise any other function given to the clerk under
24 this Act or another territory law.

25 *Note* A provision of a law that gives an entity a function also gives the entity
26 powers necessary and convenient to exercise the function (see
27 Legislation Act, s 196 and dict, pt 1, def *entity*).

1 **11 Disclosure of interests by clerk**

2 The clerk must give a written statement of the clerk's personal and
3 financial interests to the Speaker within 7 days after—

- 4 (a) the day the clerk is appointed; and
5 (b) the first day of each financial year; and
6 (c) the day there is a change in an interest.

7 **12 Delegation of clerk's functions**

8 The clerk may delegate the clerk's functions under this Act or
9 another territory law to a member of the office's staff.

10 *Note* For the making of delegations and the exercise of delegated functions,
11 see the Legislation Act, pt 19.4.

12 **13 Suspension of clerk—general**

13 (1) The Speaker may suspend the clerk on the ground of—

- 14 (a) misbehaviour; or
15 (b) physical or mental incapacity, if the incapacity substantially
16 affects the exercise of the clerk's functions.

17 *Note* Power given by a law to make a decision includes power to reverse or
18 change the decision. The power to reverse or change the decision is
19 exercisable in the same way, and subject to the same conditions, as the
20 power to make the decision (see Legislation Act, s 180).

21 (2) If the Speaker is considering suspending the clerk, the Speaker may
22 ask 1 or more of the following for advice about the proposed
23 suspension:

- 24 (a) the commissioner for public administration;
25 (b) the auditor-general;
26 (c) anyone else the Speaker considers appropriate.

- 1 (3) If the Speaker suspends the clerk, the Speaker must give written
2 notice of the suspension and a copy of a statement of the reasons for
3 the suspension to the clerk.
- 4 (4) The suspension takes effect when the notice and statement are given
5 to the clerk under subsection (3).
- 6 (5) The clerk may be suspended only under this section.
- 7 (6) The clerk is entitled to be paid salary and allowances while
8 suspended.

9 **14 Suspension of clerk—administration and procedure**
10 **committee notice and meetings**

- 11 (1) If the Speaker suspends the clerk, the Speaker must give written
12 notice of the suspension and a copy of the statement of the reasons
13 for the suspension to each other member of the administration and
14 procedure committee not later than the next business day (the *notice*
15 *day*).
- 16 (2) The administration and procedure committee must meet in relation
17 to the clerk's suspension—
- 18 (a) not later than 3 business days after the notice day; and
- 19 (b) at subsequent intervals of not longer than 30 days while the
20 clerk is suspended (a *regular meeting*).
- 21 (3) The clerk may make an oral or written submission (or both) to the
22 committee about the clerk's suspension.
- 23 (4) At each regular meeting the administration and procedure
24 committee must review the clerk's suspension and may at any time
25 pass a resolution about the suspension, including a resolution—
- 26 (a) recommending to the Speaker that the Speaker end the
27 suspension; or

1 (b) to make a statement to the Legislative Assembly
2 recommending that the Speaker end the clerk's appointment.

3 **15 Suspension of clerk—ending suspension**

4 (1) If the Speaker does not comply with section 14 (1), the suspension
5 ends at the end of the notice day.

6 (2) If the administration and procedure committee fails to hold a
7 meeting as required under section 14 (2), the suspension ends on the
8 day after the last day when the meeting could have been held.

9 (3) The following provisions apply if the administration and procedure
10 committee makes a recommendation mentioned in section 14 (4) (a)
11 and the Speaker does not end the suspension within 1 business day
12 after the day the recommendation is made:

13 (a) the committee may at any time resolve to make a statement to
14 the Legislative Assembly recommending that the suspension
15 be ended;

16 (b) if the committee makes a statement mentioned in paragraph (a)
17 and the Legislative Assembly resolves to end the suspension—
18 the suspension ends on the passing of the resolution;

19 (c) if the committee makes a statement mentioned in paragraph (a)
20 and the Legislative Assembly does not deal with the statement
21 within 3 sitting days—the suspension ends at the end of the 3rd
22 sitting day.

23 (4) If the administration and procedure committee makes a statement
24 mentioned in section 14 (4) (b)—

25 (a) the Legislative Assembly may resolve to require the Speaker to
26 end the clerk's appointment; or

27 (b) if the Legislative Assembly does not, within 3 sitting days,
28 pass a resolution mentioned in paragraph (a)—the suspension
29 ends at the end of the 3rd sitting day.

1 (5) In this section:

2 *notice day*—see section 14 (1).

3 **16 Ending of clerk’s appointment**

4 (1) The Speaker must end the clerk’s appointment if the Legislative
5 Assembly—

6 (a) passes a resolution under section 15 (4) (a); or

7 (b) otherwise resolves to require the Speaker to end the clerk’s
8 appointment—

9 (i) for misbehaviour; or

10 (ii) for physical or mental incapacity, if the incapacity
11 substantially affects the exercise of the clerk’s functions.

12 (2) The Speaker may end the clerk’s appointment if the clerk is absent
13 from duty, except on leave granted by the Speaker, for
14 14 consecutive days or for 28 days in any 12 months.

15 (3) The clerk’s appointment may be ended by the Speaker only under
16 this section or section 17.

17 **17 Retirement of clerk**

18 (1) The Speaker may retire the clerk on the ground of physical or
19 mental incapacity if—

20 (a) the incapacity substantially affects the exercise of the clerk’s
21 functions; and

22 (b) the clerk consents to the retirement.

- 1 (2) However, the clerk must not be retired on the ground of invalidity
2 unless—
- 3 (a) if the clerk is an eligible employee for the *Superannuation*
4 *Act 1976* (Cwlth)—
- 5 (i) the clerk is under the clerk’s maximum retiring age within
6 the meaning of the Act; and
- 7 (ii) a certificate has been given by the Commonwealth
8 Superannuation Board of Trustees No 2 under the Act,
9 section 54C for the clerk; or
- 10 (b) if the clerk is a member of the superannuation scheme
11 established under the *Superannuation Act 1990* (Cwlth)—
- 12 (i) the clerk is under 60 years old; and
- 13 (ii) a certificate has been given by the Commonwealth
14 Superannuation Board of Trustees No 1 under the Act,
15 section 13 for the clerk; or
- 16 (c) if the clerk is an ordinary employer-sponsored member of
17 PSSAP within the meaning of the *Superannuation Act 2005*
18 (Cwlth)—
- 19 (i) the clerk is under 60 years old; and
- 20 (ii) a certificate has been given by the Commonwealth
21 Superannuation Board of Trustees No 1 under the Act,
22 section 43 for the clerk.
- 23 (3) In this section:
- 24 ***invalidity*** means—
- 25 (a) for an eligible employee for the *Superannuation Act 1976*
26 (Cwlth)—invalidity under the Act; or

1 (b) for a member of the superannuation scheme established under
2 the *Superannuation Act 1990* (Cwlth)—invalidity under the
3 Act; or

4 (c) for an ordinary employer-sponsored member of PSSAP within
5 the meaning of the *Superannuation Act 2005* (Cwlth)—
6 invalidity under the Act.

7 *physical or mental incapacity* includes invalidity.

8 **18 Resignation of clerk**

9 (1) The clerk may resign by signed notice given to the Speaker.

10 (2) The Speaker must give a copy of a notice received under
11 subsection (1) to each member of the Legislative Assembly not later
12 than 5 business days after the day the notice is received by the
13 Speaker.

14 **19 Acting appointment as clerk**

15 (1) The Speaker may appoint the following to act as clerk:

16 (a) the deputy clerk;

17 (b) in the absence of the deputy clerk—

18 (i) any other member of the office's staff; or

19 (ii) if the Speaker is satisfied that no-one mentioned in
20 subparagraph (i) is a suitable person—a suitable person.

21 *Note* For the making of acting appointments, see the Legislation Act,
22 div 19.3.2.

23 (2) In this section:

24 *suitable person* means a person who has extensive knowledge of,
25 and experience in, relevant parliamentary law, practice and
26 procedure.

1 **Part 10** **Transitional**

2 **50** **Change of name—references to old name**

3 A reference in a document to the Legislative Assembly secretariat is
4 to be read as a reference to the office, except in relation to anything
5 that happened before this Act commenced.

6 *Note* If a law changes the name of an entity established under a law, the
7 entity continues in existence under the new name and its identity is not
8 affected by the change. A reference in a law to the entity by its
9 previous name is taken, after the change, to be a reference to the entity
10 by its new name (see Legislation Act, s 183).

11 **51** **Clerk of the Legislative Assembly**

- 12 (1) This section applies to the person who, immediately before this Act
13 commences, is the clerk of the Legislative Assembly appointed
14 under the *Public Sector Management Act 1994*, section 46 (Clerk of
15 Legislative Assembly).
- 16 (2) The person is taken to be appointed as the clerk of the Legislative
17 Assembly under this Act.

18 **52** **Staff of the Legislative Assembly**

- 19 (1) This section applies to a person who, immediately before this Act
20 commences, is a member of the staff of the Legislative Assembly
21 secretariat mentioned in the *Public Sector Management Act 1994*,
22 section 53A (b) (Legislative Assembly secretariat).
- 23 (2) The person is taken to be a member of the office's staff mentioned
24 in section 5 (2) (b).

1 **53 Expiry—pt 10**

2 This part expires 2 years after the day it commences.

3 *Note* Transitional provisions are kept in the Act for a limited time. A
4 transitional provision is repealed on its expiry but continues to have
5 effect after its repeal (see Legislation Act, s 88).

11 (1) This section applies to an annual report of the auditor-general or
12 Office of the Legislative Assembly.

13 (2) The Speaker must present the report to the Legislative Assembly
14 within 3 months after the end of the financial year (the ***3-month***
15 ***period***).

16 (3) However, if the report has not been presented to the Legislative
17 Assembly before the last 7 days of the 3-month period for the report,
18 and there are no sitting days of the Legislative Assembly during the
19 7 days—

20 (a) the auditor-general or clerk of the Legislative Assembly must
21 give a copy of the report for each member of the Legislative
22 Assembly to the Speaker before the end of the 3-month period;
23 and

24 (b) the Speaker must arrange for a copy of the report to be given to
25 each member of the Legislative Assembly on the day the
26 auditor-general or clerk gives it to the Speaker; and

- 1 (c) the Speaker must present the report to the Legislative
2 Assembly—
- 3 (i) on the next sitting day after the end of the 3-month
4 period; or
- 5 (ii) if the next sitting day is the first meeting of the
6 Legislative Assembly after a general election of members
7 of the Assembly—on the second sitting day after the
8 election.
- 9 (4) At the request of the auditor-general or clerk, the Speaker may
10 present a report of the auditor-general or Office of the Legislative
11 Assembly to the Legislative Assembly after the time required under
12 subsection (2) or, if applicable, subsection (3).
- 13 (5) If subsection (4) applies, the Speaker must present the report to the
14 Legislative Assembly as soon as possible.
