Government Procurement Amendment Act 2026

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An Act to amend the *Government Procurement Act 2001* and the *Government Procurement Regulation 2007*

The Legislative Assembly for the Australian Capital Territory enacts as follows:

Part 1 Preliminary

1 Name of Act

This Act is the *Government Procurement Amendment Act 2026*.

2 Commencement

This Act commences on a day fixed by the Minister by written notice.

Note 1 The naming and commencement provisions automatically commence on the notification day (see [Legislation Act](#), s 75 (1)).

Note 2 A single day or time may be fixed, or different days or times may be fixed, for the commencement of different provisions (see [Legislation Act](#), s 77 (1)).

Note 3 If a provision has not commenced within 6 months beginning on the notification day, it automatically commences on the first day after that period (see [Legislation Act](#), s 79).

 - (b) the guidelines made under section 22U;
 - (c) the government procurement rules;
 - (d) the government procurement practices.

- (3) However, a Territory entity may obtain an oral quotation from a supplier for a procurement with an estimated total consideration of less than \$500.

15 Limited tender procurement
Section 7 (2)

- (2) The Territory entity must seek at least—
- (a) 3 written quotations for the procurement from suppliers; or
 - (b) 1 written quotation for the procurement from a supplier that is—
 - (i) a certified Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander entity; or
 - (ii) a small or medium business entity based in the ACT or surrounding region.

- (3) In this section:

Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander person means a person who—

- (a) is a descendant of an Aboriginal person or a Torres Strait Islander person; and
- (b) identifies as an Aboriginal person or a Torres Strait Islander person; and
- (c) is accepted as an Aboriginal person or a Torres Strait Islander person by an Aboriginal community or a Torres Strait Islander community.

certified Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander entity means an entity that—

- (a) is at least 50% owned and operated by an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander person; and
- (b) has been certified by another entity to be owned and operated by an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander person.

Examples—certifying entities

- Supply Nation
- National Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisation (NACCHO)
- Office of the Registrar of Indigenous Corporations

entity based in the ACT or surrounding region means an entity that is permanently and primarily located in the ACT or the following areas under the *Local Government Act 1993* (NSW):

- (a) Bega Valley;
- (b) Eurobodalla;
- (c) Goulburn Mulwaree;
- (d) Hilltops;
- (e) Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional;
- (f) Snowy Monaro Regional;
- (g) Snowy Valleys;
- (h) Upper Lachlan Shire;
- (i) Wingecarribee;
- (j) Yass Valley.

small or medium business entity means an entity that employs less than 200 people.

**16 Exemption reasons—limited and open tender procurement

- (1A) Subsection (1) (i) applies whether the additional goods or services are supplied under the initial procurement contract as amended or a new procurement contract.

10 Exemptions—limited tender procurement

The responsible chief executive officer for a Territory entity may, in writing, exempt the Territory entity from the requirement under section 7 (2) (a) to seek at least 3 written quotations if satisfied on reasonable grounds that at least 1 of the exemption reasons applies.

**21 Procurements to be reviewed by board—Act,
s 29 (2) (a) (i)
Section 14 (1)**

- (1) The following procurements by Territory entities must be reviewed by the board:
- (a) a procurement that is—
 - (i) in the planning period; and
 - (ii) has an estimated total consideration of \$7 million or more;
 - (b) a procurement that is in the planning period if—
 - (i) the procurement relates to information and communications technology that includes an element of system development or redesign; or
 - (ii) the procurement is to enter into a standing-offer arrangement under which goods or services may be supplied to more than 1 Territory entity;
 - (c) a procurement that proposes to substantially change the scope or nature of an existing procurement contract if the change is not expressly provided for in the existing procurement contract;
 - (d) a procurement if—
 - (i) a procurement contract has not yet been entered into for the procurement; and
 - (ii) there are significant concerns about probity;
 - (e) a procurement that is referred to the board by any of the following:
 - (i) the Minister;
 - (ii) a responsible chief executive officer for a Territory entity;

- (iii) the administrative unit responsible for administering the Act;
 - (iv) a person who has been engaged by a Territory entity to investigate whether the procurement was undertaken with probity;
 - (f) any other procurement that the board considers should be reviewed.
- (1A) However, the board is not required to review a procurement under subsection (1) (a), (b) or (c) if—
- (a) the procurement is of a kind mentioned in section 9 (1) (i); and
 - (b) the responsible chief executive officer for the Territory entity undertaking the procurement has exempted the Territory entity under section 10 or section 10A in relation to the procurement.
