# Eggs (Labelling and Sale) Bill 2001

## A Bill for

An Act about the labelling and sale of hen eggs, and for other purposes

The Legislative Assembly for the Australian Capital Territory enacts as follows:

2		This Act is the Eggs (Labelling and Sale) Act 2001.	
3	2	Commencement	
4 5 6	(1)	Section 9 commences immediately after the commencement of the Legislation (Consequential Amendments) Act 2001, schedule 1, part 19.	
7 8	(2)	The remaining provisions commence immediately after the commencement of the <i>Food Act 2001</i> , section 4 (Dictionary).	
9 10		Note	The naming and commencement provisions automatically commence on the notification day (see <i>Legislation Act 2001</i> , s 75).
11	3	Dictionary	
12		The dictionary at the end of this Act is part of this Act.	
13 14 15 16		Note 1	The dictionary at the end of this Act defines certain words and expressions used in this Act, and includes references (signpost definitions) to other words and expressions defined elsewhere in this Act.
17 18 19			For example, the signpost definition 'egg labelling requirements—see section 5 (What are the egg labelling requirements).' means that the expression 'egg labelling requirements' is defined in that section.

1	5	What are the egg labelling requirements		
2		For this Act, a reference to the <i>egg labelling requirements</i> , for he eggs, means—		
4 5 6		(a) the packaging for the eggs displays the relevant expression in schedule 1 indicating the conditions under which the hens that produced the eggs are kept; and		
7 8		(b) the relevant expression is preceded or followed by the word 'egg' or 'eggs'; and		
9 10		(c) the relevant expression is conspicuously displayed on the packaging in standard type of at least 6mm high.		
11	6	Labelling of egg packages		
12 13		A person must not sell hen eggs unless the eggs are packaged in accordance with the egg labelling requirements.		
14 15		Maximum penalty: 50 penalty units, imprisonment for 6 months or both.		
16	7	Hens kept contrary to law—sale of eggs		
17 18 19	(1)	A person must not sell eggs produced by a hen kept in a way that is an offence against a Territory law or that would be an offence against a Territory law if the hen were kept in the Territory.		
20 21		Maximum penalty: 50 penalty units, imprisonment for 6 months or both.		
22 23	(2)	This section does not apply to the sale of a product in which her eggs are an ingredient.		
24	8	Regulation-making power		
25		The Executive may make regulations for this Act.		
26 27		Note Regulations must be notified, and presented to the Legislative Assembly, under the Legislation Act 2001.

		(b) in accordance with the stocking level and other requirements for cage systems under the code.

		(a) with the freedom and capacity to socialise, to move freely within the shed, to stretch, perch, nest, dust bathe, flap wings and fly; and	
		(b) with adequate perching facilities and nests available to birds within the shed to accommodate the needs of all hens; and	
		(c) with half the housing kept under litter; and	
		(d) in accordance with the stocking level and other requirements for deep litter systems on a single level under the code.	
3	aviary	Hens are kept in a shed	
		(a) with the freedom and capacity to socialise, to move freely within the shed, to stretch, perch, nest, dust bathe, flap wings and fly; and	
		(b) with adequate perching facilities and nests available to birds on a number of levels within the shed to accommodate the needs of all hens; and	
		(c) with half the housing kept under litter; and	
		(d) in accordance with the stocking level and other requirements for deep litter systems under the code with the allowance of a number of additional levels of nesting and perching space.

4	free range	Hens are kept—	
		(a) with continuous daytime access to outdoor runs; and	
		(b) with access at all times to indoor litter, perches and nests; and	
		(c) with adequate protection at all times from predators and the elements; and	
		(d) in accordance with the stocking level and other requirements for range systems under the code.

- (c) have in possession for sale; or
- (d) display for sale; or
- (e) cause or permit to be sold or offered for sale; or
- 18 (f) send, forward or deliver for sale; or
- 19 (g) dispose of by any method for valuable consideration; or
- 20 (h) dispose of to an agent for sale on consignment; or
- 21 (i) sell for the purpose of resale.
