3			A carer must secure the clothing and other possessions of an intoxicated person who is admitted to a licensed place.
5	6C		Power of carer to search intoxicated person
6 7		(1)	A carer may require an intoxicated person to undergo a frisk search in a licensed place.
8		(2)	The frisk search of an intoxicated person must, if practicable, be carried out by a person of the same sex as the intoxicated person.
10 11 12		(3)	If the intoxicated person is a transgender or intersex person, the person may ask that the frisk search be carried out by either a male or a female.

15 16		(4)	If the intoxicated person asks that the frisk search be carried out by a male, the person is taken, for this section, to be male.
17 18		(5)	If the intoxicated person asks that the frisk search be carried out by a female, the person is taken, for this section, to be female.

20 21 22			<i>frisk search</i> , of an intoxicated person, means a search in which light pressure is momentarily applied to the person over the person's outer clothing without contact being made with—
23			(a) the person's genital or anal areas; or
24			(b) for a female—the person's breasts.

1	6D		Leaving licensed place
2		(1)	An intoxicated person who is admitted to a licensed place may leave the licensed place at any time.
4 5 6		(2)	An intoxicated person who is admitted to a licensed place is taken to have left the licensed place if the person goes outside the licensed place unsupervised by a carer.
7 8		(3)	A carer must return an intoxicated person's possessions to the person when the person leaves the licensed place.
9	7		Information to be given to intoxicated person
10 11			The carer who admits an intoxicated person to a licensed place must tell the person that—
12			(a) the person may leave the licensed place at any time; and
13 14 15			(b) if the person goes outside the licensed place unsupervised by a carer, the person will be taken to have left the licensed place; and
16 17			(c) the person will be given adequate opportunity to contact a responsible person or other appropriate person.
18	8		Contacting other people
19 20 21			A licensee must ensure that an intoxicated person admitted to a licensed place has adequate opportunity to contact a responsible person or other appropriate person.
