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# 1 83C When a vehicle is a total loss

For this division, a vehicle is a *total loss* if the vehicle has been damaged by any event to the extent that its fair salvage value plus the cost of repairing the vehicle for use on a road or road related area would be more than its fair market value immediately before the event that caused the damage.

8 Collision, fire, flood, accident, trespass, dismantling and demolition.

# 9 83D Written-off vehicles register

- 10 (1) The road transport authority must keep a written-off vehicles 11 register.
- (2) The register may include information given to the road transport
   authority under this Act and any other information the authority
   considers appropriate.
- (3) The register may be kept in the form of, or as part of, 1 or more
   computer databases or in any other form the road transport authority
   considers appropriate.
- (4) The road transport authority may correct any mistake, error or
   omission in the register subject to the requirements (if any) of the
   regulations.
- (5) The road transport authority may authorise a person to make entriesin the register.
- (6) This section does not limit the functions of the road transportauthority in relation to the register.

### 25 83E Security of information in register

The road transport authority must ensure that information in the written-off vehicles register that is of a personal nature or has commercial sensitivity for the person about whom it is kept is released only in accordance with this Act or another law in force in the ACT.
