A Bill for

An Act to amend the law relating to justice and community safety

The Legislative Assembly for the Australian Capital Territory enacts as follows:

1 **1 Name of Act**

2 This Act is the *Justice and Community Safety Legislation*
3 *Amendment Act 2007 (No 2)*.

4 **2 Commencement**

5 This Act commences on the 21st day after its notification day.

6 *Note* The naming and commencement provisions automatically commence on
7 the notification day (see Legislation Act, s 75 (1)).

8 **3 Legislation amended—sch 1**

9 This Act amends the legislation mentioned in schedule 1.
