#### Division of City – *Aboriginal words, pioneers and capital cities*

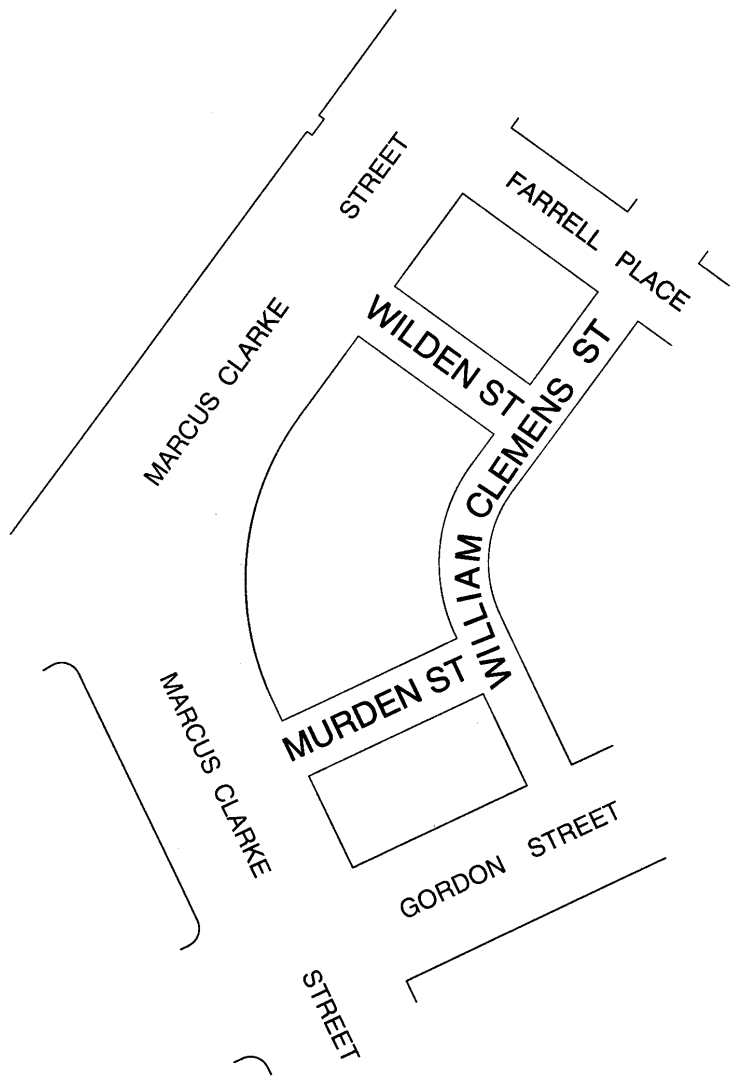
NAME	ORIGIN	SIGNIFICANCE
William Clemens Street	Sir William Clemens (1873-1941)	<p>Canberra Pioneer and Public Servant</p> <p>Sir William Clemens was born in Beechworth, Victoria. He entered the Victorian Public Service in 1889 and transferred to the Commonwealth Public Service in 1901.</p> <p>He was secretary to the Public Service Commissioner from 1903-1916, Commonwealth Public Service Inspector of Victoria and Tasmania from 1916-23 and was a Royal Commissioner appointed to report on the Public Service of the Mandated Territory of New Guinea.</p> <p>Other important positions held by Sir William were Secretary of the Department of Home and Territories between 1928 and 1929, Public Service Commissioner from 1929-1933 and Chairman of the Commonwealth Public Service Board of Commissioners 1933-1937.</p> <p>He was president of the Canberra division of the Red Cross from 1939 to 1941.</p> <p>Sir William was made a Companion of the Order of St Michael and St George in 1934 and was created a Knight Bachelor in 1937. He was also a Companion of the Imperial Service Order.</p>
Wilden Street	Iris Sophie Carnall (nee Wilden) (1900-1998)	<p>Canberra Pioneer</p> <p>Iris Sophie Wilden was born in Blundell's Cottage, Canberra, ACT. She was schooled at St. John's in Reid and the Cross Roads school where Manuka fire station now stands.</p> <p>Iris spent most of her childhood at <i>Mugga Mugga</i>, where her father worked and the family lived, in an area that appeared on early Canberra maps as "Wilden's Farm".</p> <p>Iris married Keith Carnall at Christ Church, Queanbeyan in 1919. They had five children: Doreen, Gwen, Edwin, Edna and Alan.</p>

NAME	ORIGIN	SIGNIFICANCE
Murden Street	Cyril Murray Murden (1893-1962)	Canberra Pioneer  Cyril Murray Murden was born in Mildura and arrived in Canberra in 1922. He was instrumental in the establishment of a number of sporting clubs and facilities in the region.  He was honorary secretary of the Canberra Tennis Association 1926; honorary secretary of the Federal Capital Territory (FTC) Cricket Club 1936-37; and, treasurer Canberra Amateur Swimming Club 1931-32.
