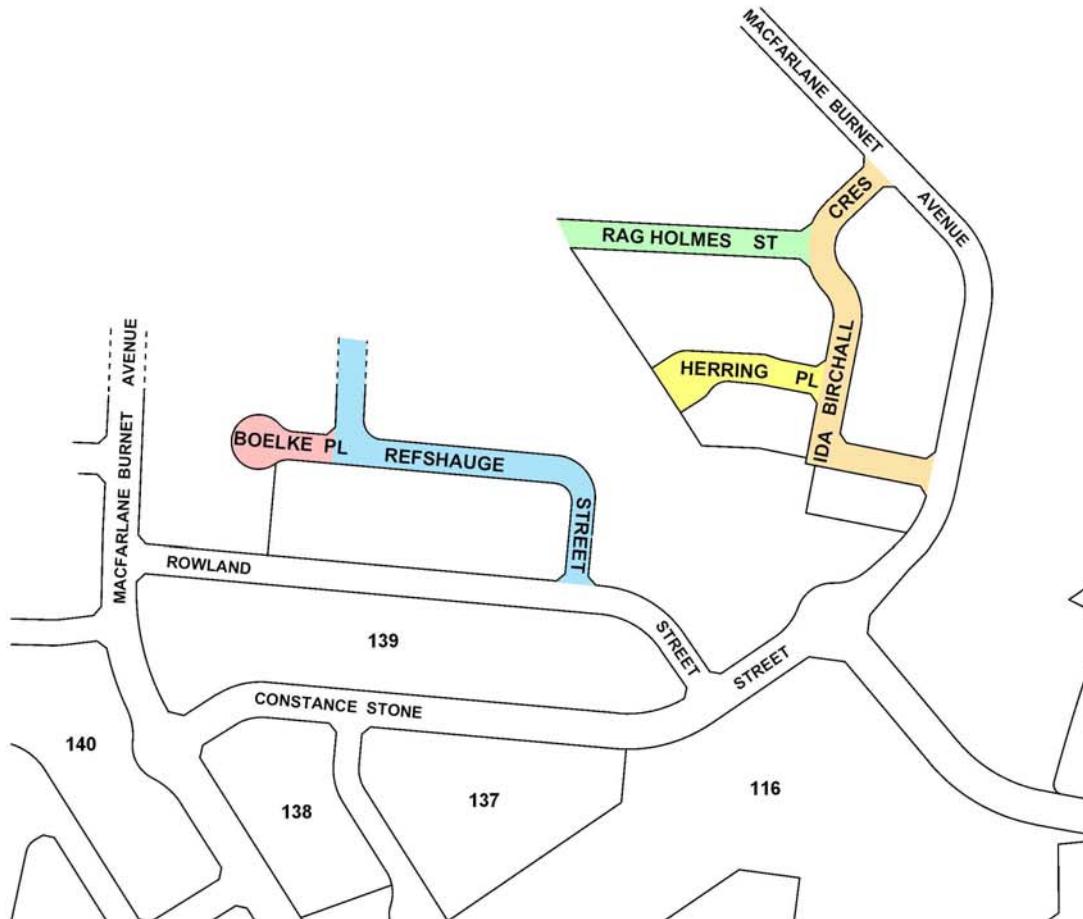

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Division of Macgregor: *Medical Profession*

NAME	ORIGIN	SIGNIFICANCE
Boelke Place	Grace Fairley Boelke (1870-1948)	Medical practitioner Grace Boelke was one of the first women medical graduates of the University of Sydney. She was founder of the Professional Women's Association and a strong advocate of improved conditions for women.
Herring Place	Dame Mary Ranken Lyle Herring DBE(C), CStJ (1895-1981)	Medical practitioner and community worker Dame Mary Herring was one of the first women medical graduates of the University of Melbourne. She achieved first class honours in all subjects. Mary was appointed Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empire in 1960 for service to nursing in Victoria.
	Mary Cecile "Molly" Longfield nee Herring (1924-2007)	Medical practitioner Daughter of Dame Mary and Sir Edmund Herring. Mary worked tirelessly for the good of her patients.
Ida Birchall Crescent	Ida Lois Birchall MBE(C) (1906-1994)	Obstetrician and gynaecologist Ida Birchall was one of Tasmania's first female doctors. She became the first Tasmanian member of the Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists in 1936. She was appointed Member of the Order of the British Empire for services to medicine in 1969.

Rag Holmes Street	Roland (Rag) Adrian Glennie Holmes AM (1918-2007)	Medical practitioner and community worker Rag Holmes was a World War II medical officer before settling in Yass, NSW, where he practised for 35 years in partnership with Dr David Graham. These were medically challenging years when accidents were frequent on the Hume Highway and before Canberra was equipped with advanced medical services. He was an accomplished musician and in 1983 was appointed a member of the Order of Australia and later awarded a Centenary Medal for his voluntary service to the community.
Refshauge Street	Major General Sir William Refshauge AC, CBE, ED (1913-2009)	Medical officer, practitioner and administrator. Sir William Refshauge graduated in medicine in 1938, served in the AIF as a medical officer during World War II, and was medical superintendent of a women's hospital in Melbourne, before resuming his medical career with the Australian Army during the Korean War. He retired from the service in the rank of major-general in 1960, and subsequently held the post of Commonwealth Director General of Health for 13 years. In 1973 he was Secretary-General of the World Medical Association in Switzerland until 1976.
