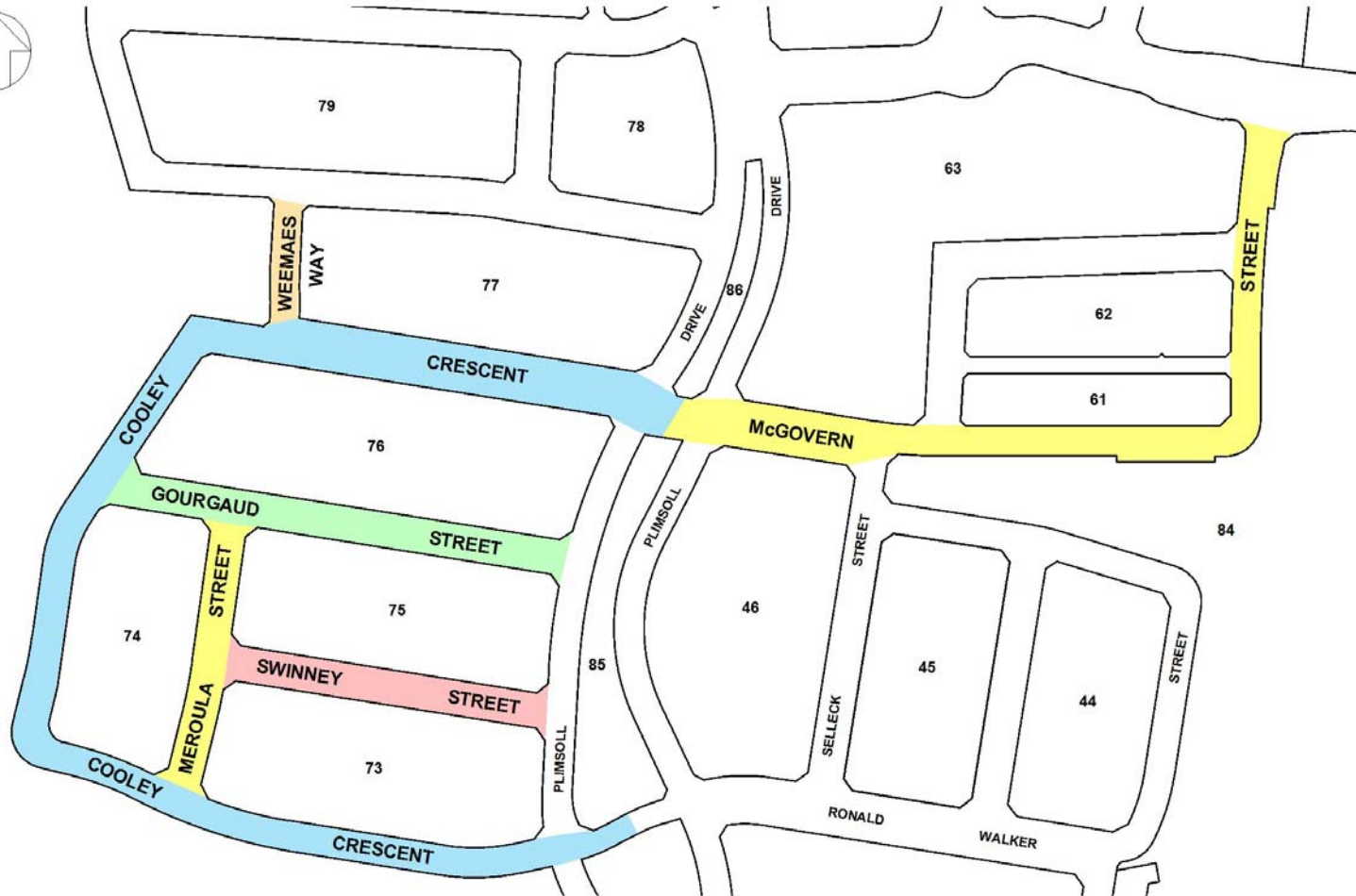
NAME	ORIGIN	SIGNIFICANCE
Cooley Crescent	Sir Alan Sydenham Cooley CBE (1920-1997)	Commonwealth public service Secretary, Department of Productivity 1977-1981; Chairman of the Australian Public Service Board 1971-1977; Secretary, Department of Supply 1966-1971; and held a number of engineering management positions from 1940.
Gourgaud Street	Percival Albert Gourgaud OBE (1881-1958)	Commonwealth public service Assistant Secretary of the Department of the Interior 1932-1946 overseeing the development of the ACT; Secretary of the Department of Works and Railways 1929-1932; first Secretary of the River Murray Commission 1916-1929; also a nominated member of the ACT Advisory Council 1930-1946.
McGovern Street	Sir Patrick Sylvesta McGovern CBE (1895-1975)	Commonwealth public service Commissioner of Taxation 1946-1961; formerly Second Commissioner from 1942; joined public service in 1911; appointed CBE in 1954 and knighted in 1959; president of Rotary Club of Canberra and a foundation member of the Commonwealth Club.
Meroula Street	Meroula (Mollie) Frances Fellowes Lukis (1911-2009)	Western Australia public service First State Archivist appointed in WA and first female State Archivist in Australia; actively involved in promoting WA history and heritage through libraries, museums, historical societies and the National Trust; also a champion of women's equality and opportunity through equal pay and a university women's college.
Swinney Street	Stella Edith Swinney (1911-1999)	Administrator and public servant Assistant Controller of the Australian Women's Army Service NSW, 1944; one of Australia's first female migration officers to serve abroad in 1950, interviewing hundreds of UK women; Principal of Duval College, University of New England 1962-1972.
