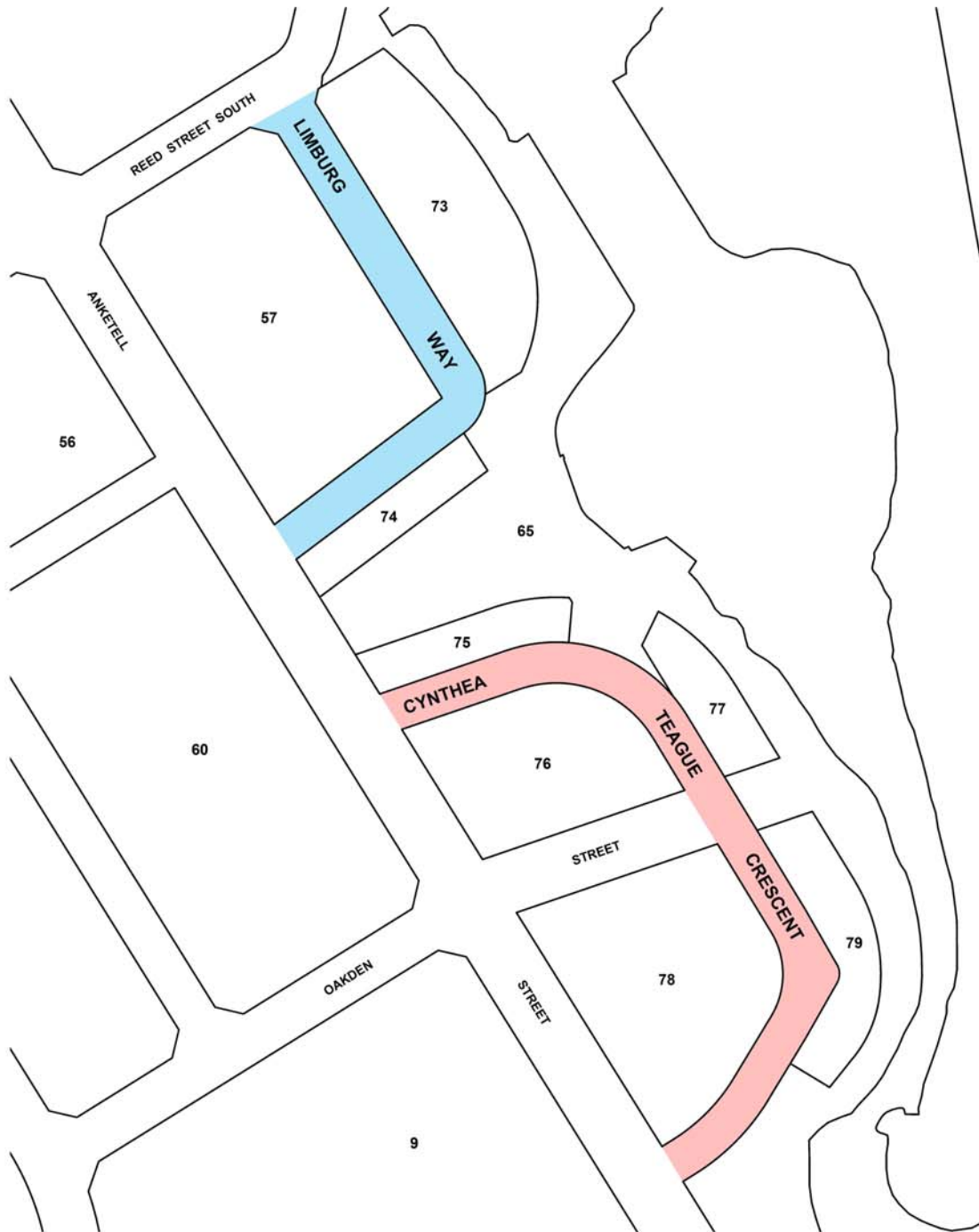

NAME	ORIGIN	SIGNIFICANCE
Cynthea Teague Crescent	Cynthea Mary Teague MBE (1906-2007)	Architect, public servant Among Victoria's early women architects when she graduated from the University of Melbourne in 1930, winning the Grice Bronze Medal for outstanding student design; worked in private practice in Melbourne, 1928-41; employed in the Commonwealth Department of Works 1941-70; involved in postwar reconstruction, designing tropical housing in Darwin, armament factories and major Commonwealth office buildings and overseas diplomatic accommodation. Promoted to supervising architect, 1959 and superintending architect, 1960; seconded to the Department of External Affairs, 1960; first woman admitted to the executive level of the Commonwealth Public Service when promoted to Assistant Director-General (Prestige and Special Projects) Head Office, Department of Works, 1964. Miss Teague retired in 1970 and was appointed a Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) in 1971.

Limburg Way	David Edward Limburg (1901-1973)	Architect, public servant Among the new graduates who joined the Federal Capital Commission Architects Office in 1926; provided the original drawings for the Sydney and Melbourne Buildings, and the Albert Hall; supervised the construction of West Block and Hotels Kurrajong and Acton; honorary architect for repairs and restoration of the Church of St John the Baptist and honorary supervising architect for construction of its rectory. Resigned November 1926 to join L.H Rudd in private practice; designed the Church of England Girls Grammar School and private homes in Canberra. Appointed Architect Grade 1, Department of the Interior (Works and Services Branch) NSW, 1937; Assistant Director of Works, Department of Works and Housing (ACT), 1946-50; transferred to Sydney 1950; promoted to Assistant Director of Works, Technical Division, Canberra, 1955; Construction Manager, Construction Section Sydney, 1964. David Limburg was also associated with development of the arts in Canberra, serving as founding secretary, Canberra Society of Artists in 1927.
