NAME	ORIGIN	SIGNIFICANCE
Glasswing Park	Glasswing butterfly <i>(Acraea andromacha)</i> Also known as Little Greasy or Small Greasy	Butterfly; family Nymphalidae (Nymphs) The Glasswing is a medium sized black and white butterfly with a fore wing that is almost transparent, like glass, with dark brown spots. The hind wing is white or cream in colour with embedded black spots. The species has a wingspan of between 53 to 56 millimetres. The Glasswing butterfly has a slow, gliding flight within a few metres of the ground, interspersed with perching on low plants usually with closed wings. The butterfly is widely distributed in northern and eastern Australia. In the Australian Capital Territory, the Glasswing has been recorded at the Australian National Botanic Gardens, Black Mountain, Mount Ainslie, Mount Coree and Red Hill. There are records of summer breeding on native Passion Vine, <i>Passiflora cinnabarina</i> at the Botanic Gardens.
