## **EXPLANATORY STATEMENT**

Section 96 of the *Road Transport (General) Act 1999* allows the Minister to determine fees, charges and other amounts payable under the ACT road transport legislation.

This disallowable instrument has the effect of determining the fees for various kinds of road transport publications.

The fees for ACT publications have been increased by the estimated 2024-25 wage price index of (WPI) 3.5% in accordance with rates published in Budget Memo 2024/28, and an additional index of 0.35%, 3.85% in total, on items 2 to 5 and 7 as fees for regulatory services as per budget memo 2024-14, rounded down to the nearest ten cents. The fee for the National Heavy Vehicle driver work diary has been increased from \$29.00 to \$30.00 based on advice from the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator.

Indexing fees and charges annually maintains the cost of the product or service being provided.

Column 1 of schedule 1 lists the item number for which the fee is payable. Column 2 of schedule 1 describes the service or other matter in relation to the fee payable. Column 3 of schedule 1 lists the fee payable on or before 30 June 2025. Column 4 of schedule 1 lists the fee payable on or after 1 July 2025.

The preference of the Standing Committee on Justice and Community Safety (Legislative Scrutiny Role) that Instruments or Explanatory Statements identify the amount of the old and new fee, any percentage increase and also the reason for any increase in the Instrument or the Explanatory Statement has been taken into account in the preparation of the Instrument and the Explanatory Statement.

There are no human rights or climate change implications arising from this instrument.

This determination is a disallowable instrument and must be presented to the Legislative Assembly within 6 sitting days after its notification pursuant to section 64 of the *Legislation Act 2001*.
