# DECISION NOT TO PROVISIONALLY REGISTER MURALS AT LYNEHAM HIGH SCHOOL

# **Summary**

The murals at Lyneham High were removed at an unknown time and their current location is not known. The integrity and condition of the murals is also unknown. The Council cannot be satisfied that they meet the criteria due to this lack of information.

This Statement of Reasons provides an assessment of the murals at Lyneham High School and finds that they do meet any of the criteria of the *Heritage Act 2004*.

# **Background**

It is unknown when the murals at Lyneham High School were nominated to the ACT Heritage Register however the place was identified as nominated as early as 2000.

At Meeting # 39 on 20 October 2011 the ACT Heritage Council endorsed a Statement of Reasons which does not find the Lyneham High School murals eligible for provisional registration.

#### Assessment

In assessing the nomination for the murals at Lyneham High School, the Council considered:

#### **History**

It is understood that the two murals (*Untitled*) were produced by artist Cedric Flower, commissioned by the National Capital Development Commission (NCDC) and installed in 1960. At that time the Sculpture sub committee of the NCDC had a policy of including works of art in all schools through the architects briefs. *Untitled* was the first such work to be installed.

The murals were located on either side of the entrance hall at the High School.

#### **Description**

The two painted murals on hardboard, signed and dated, measured 107cm x 1097cm.

#### Physical condition and integrity

The murals were removed from the entrance hall at Lyneham High School at an unknown time and their current location is also unknown.
