INFECTIOUS DISEASES POLICY

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Purpose

To outline the policy to reduce the risk of the spread of infectious disease at correctional centres.

Authority

Legislation

Policy

Principles

In order to reduce infectious diseases within correctional centres, staff and detainees will be given appropriate information and training.

Corrections officers will be mindful of the risk of infectious diseases and take the following precautions:

- treat all bodily fluids (e.g. blood, vomit, urine, semen) as if that fluid is infectious;
- handle needles or other sharp objects in accordance with the *Management of Blood Spills and Needle Stick Procedure*;
- keep all cuts, scratches or wounds covered with a waterproof dressing when on duty; and
- ensure detainees cover cuts and open wounds, and refer skin complaints to health care staff.

Hand washing

Hand washing is an important measure in controlling infection. Hands should be washed before and after an incident.

Personal protection kit

Each corrections officer is issued with a 'Personal Protection Kit', which contains the following basic protective equipment:

- disposable gloves;
- eye wash;
- wound irrigation;
- hydrogen peroxide bleach; and
- bandaids.

Corrections officers are responsible for keeping their kits stocked. Items that have been used or have passed the use by date are to be disposed of appropriately.

Information to detainees

On admission to the AMC, all detainees will undergo a health assessment. Health staff will provide appropriate treatment or referral as necessary.

Corrections Health staff at the health centre can provide detainees with:

- information on the health services available to detainees;
- literature regarding infectious diseases, including Hepatitis B, C and HIV/AIDS;
- infectious diseases counselling;
- diagnostic blood tests; and
- treatment.

Corrections officers should facilitate any requests for information referring the matter to staff at the health centre.

Catering, food handling and hygiene

All detainees involved in food preparation are to receive training in safety and hygiene requirements.

Detainees working in areas of food preparation are to be monitored for any health condition that may present a compromise to them performing kitchen duties by the Catering Supervisor and catering staff. Detainees who are declared temporarily unfit to work in the kitchen, are to return to work only after they have been assessed and provided with a certificate of clearance from a doctor.

Detainees employed in areas involving food handling must, at all times, use disposable gloves whilst handling food.
