### About this republication

#### The republished law

This is a republication of the *Juries Regulation 2018*, made under the *Juries Act 1967* (including any amendment made under the *Legislation Act 2001*, part 11.3 (Editorial changes)) as in force on 30 September 2023. It also includes any commencement, amendment, repeal or expiry affecting this republished law to 30 September 2023.

The legislation history and amendment history of the republished law are set out in endnotes 3 and 4.

### Kinds of republications

The Parliamentary Counsel's Office prepares 2 kinds of republications of ACT laws (see the ACT legislation register at www.legislation.act.gov.au):

- authorised republications to which the Legislation Act 2001 applies
- unauthorised republications.

The status of this republication appears on the bottom of each page.

#### **Editorial changes**

The *Legislation Act 2001*, part 11.3 authorises the Parliamentary Counsel to make editorial amendments and other changes of a formal nature when preparing a law for republication. Editorial changes do not change the effect of the law, but have effect as if they had been made by an Act commencing on the republication date (see *Legislation Act 2001*, s 115 and s 117). The changes are made if the Parliamentary Counsel considers they are desirable to bring the law into line, or more closely into line, with current legislative drafting practice.

This republication does not include amendments made under part 11.3 (see endnote 1).

### **Uncommenced provisions and amendments**

If a provision of the republished law has not commenced, the symbol  $\boxed{\textbf{U}}$  appears immediately before the provision heading. Any uncommenced amendments that affect this republished law are accessible on the ACT legislation register (www.legislation.act.gov.au). ### **Modifications**

# Disqualified people, exempt people and people who may claim exemption—Act, s 11

- (1) A person mentioned in schedule 1, part 1.2, column 2 is disqualified for the period mentioned in column 3.
- (2) A person mentioned in schedule 1, part 1.3, column 2 is exempt for the period mentioned in column 3.
- (3) A person mentioned in schedule 1, part 1.4 may claim an exemption.

### Part 1.1 General

### 1.1 Meaning of standard—sch 1

In this schedule:

**standard** means the period during which a person is employed in the occupation or affected by the circumstance mentioned in schedule 1, part 1.3, column 2.

Note 1 Doctor, enrolled nurse, nurse, nurse practitioner and public trustee and guardian are defined in the Legislation Act, dictionary, pt 1.

Note 2 Nurse includes a midwife (see Legislation Act, dict, pt 1).
