| Camilleri Way | Paul Anthony Camilleri (1920-2013) | Building industry, Canberran, community service Paul Camilleri was recruited to Canberra from Malta in 1949 by the Department of Housing and Public Works and employed as a leading hand (carpenter) on government building sites. He was appointed foreman for a private firm in the mid-1950s to supervise the construction of government housing in Canberra. He established his own construction business, Paul Camilleri & Co, in 1959. His company was awarded contracts on behalf of the Federal Government to build over 650 government houses and other government facilities during a period of rapid growth in Canberra. In 1971 Camilleri was acknowledged by Sir John Overall, Commissioner of the National Capital Development Commission, for "... considerable contribution to Canberra's development ...and to the Canberra housing scene". Paul Camilleri was a founding member of the Maltese-Australian Association of Canberra and Queanbeyan. He retired from the construction industry in 1982. |
